

NCSP Sector Update August 2023

12 SEPTEMBER 2023 – GO LIVE FOR HPV TESTING AND NEW PRIORITY FUNDING

HPV primary screening and cervical screening services for priority groups will soon 'go live.'

Sector training is currently underway, and we are continuing to answer questions as they arise.

The Updated Timeline provides information related to training and collateral availability ahead of the 12 September 2023 'go live' date.

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Encouraging participation

Changes to cervical screening from 12 September 2023 are designed to reduce cases of cervical cancer in Aotearoa New Zealand. Human Papillomavirus (HPV) testing as primary screening will be much easier for most participants to undertake and also allows more pre-cancers to be identified.

New HPV testing means most participants, after consultation with their healthcare provider, will be able to choose one of two cervical screening test options:


- HPV vaginal swab test, either a self-test or assisted by a clinician
- A clinician-taken cervical specimen, previously referred to as a smear test, which is tested for HPV. If HPV is detected cytology will be processed automatically without the person needing to return for another test.

New information technology solutions will 'go live' on 12 September 2023. The new NCSP-Register will make it easier to invite those not regularly screening to take part, offer support needed to attend screenings or follow up services (such as transport assistance), and make answers to common screening questions more accessible. It will also make it easier for people to know when they are due for their next appointment.

Te Whatu Ora is finalising details related to the new funding package made available to reduce barriers to screening and encourage participation in the programme; an update will be provided as soon as information is available.

Anyone due or overdue for screening is still encouraged to get screened now using the current procedures and testing. The current cervical screening test (often called a smear test) is safe and effective in protecting against cervical cancer.

Updated Timeline: September Go-Live



eLearning modules now available

A 4-module clinical eLearning course for HPV primary screening is now available on <u>LearnOnline</u>. <u>Cervical Screening Using Human Papillomavirus (HPV) Testing</u> is essential learning for cervical sample-takers. You can create an account for LearnOnline <u>here</u>, if you don't already have one.

Modules must be completed sequentially. There is a 10-to-15 minute delay after completing a module before you can access the next one. All four modules must be completed to receive a Certificate of Completion.

The Royal New Zealand College of General Practitioners (RNZCGP) has approved the eLearning modules and informed us that:

The "Cervical Screening Using Human Papillomavirus (HPV) Testing" activity has been endorsed by The Royal New Zealand College of General Practitioners (RNZCGP) and has been approved for up to 1 CME Credit per Module for Continuing Professional Development (CPD) purposes.



GPs can now obtain 1 credit per module – a great incentive to get them completed. The RNZCGP endorsement is valid for one year, expiring on 31 August 2024.

Module 1 (~60 minutes)

Introduction to Cervical Screening Using Human Papillomavirus (HPV) Testing provides:

- an overview of cervical screening in Aotearoa New Zealand,
- an introduction to the new Clinical Practice Guidelines for cervical screening,
- an understanding of HPV and its role in the development of cervical cancer; and
- information on HPV vaccination, HPV testing, and pathways.

Module 2 (~30 minutes)

Navigating the Cervical Screening pathways - practising using the pathways with various cases, presents:

- a series of examples of how to interpret the cervical screening pathways in the Clinical Practice Guidelines for Cervical Screening in Aotearoa New Zealand; and
- a further 13 scenarios, to give you a chance to check your understanding and apply the guidelines to each situation.

Module 3 (~30 minutes)

<u>Cervical Screening in Aotearoa New Zealand – History and Context</u> provides an overview of:

- the History of the National Cervical Screening Programme, including the National Kaitiaki Group, and the Register;
- the persisting inequities in cervical screening;
- aligning with new health reforms; and
- reflecting on practice to improve health equity.

Module 4 (~60 minutes)

Talking about Cervical Screening and HPV covers:

- talking to your patients about HPV primary screening;
- barriers to screening;
- how to have culturally-safe and effective conversations about cervical screening; and
- how to share test results with your patients.

PHO Report update

There will be no report sent out in September so IT systems have time to transition to HPV primary screening and for reporting to be thoroughly tested. The last PHO data match report in its current form will be sent on 25 August 2023.

The new PHO data match report will be called the *PHO cervical screening status report* and will be delivered on 20 October 2023. Monthly reporting will resume thereafter.

The new PHO report will be updated to be fit for purpose in the new HPV Primary Screening programme – this includes (but it is not limited to) updating most recent event, next expected event, and due dates in accordance with the new clinical pathway.

An example of the new report along with guidelines detailing the new variables and fields will be available week commencing 28 August – it will be emailed to all current recipients.

Family Planning Report update

There will be no report sent out in September to allow the data IT systems sufficient time to transition to HPV primary screening and the reporting to be thoroughly tested to ensure complete and accurate data. The last Family Planning data match report in its current form will be sent out on 25 August 2023.

The Family Planning report will be updated to be fit for purpose in the new HPV Primary Screening programme and will be renamed the *Family Planning cervical screening status report*; it will first be delivered on 20 October 2023. Monthly reporting will resume thereafter.

NCSP coverage report update

The NCSP coverage report will be updated as usual on 25th August 2023; this will cover reporting for 1-31 July 2023. There will be no report sent out in September— this is to allow the data IT systems sufficient time to transition to HPV primary screening and the reporting to be thoroughly tested to ensure complete and accurate data.

The NCSP coverage report will be updated on 25th October and include coverage up to and including 30 September 2023.

There will be a change to the coverage calculation from October onwards to align with the transition to HPV primary screening. Additional details will be provided in the technical notes of NCSP coverage report. Monthly reporting will resume thereafter.

Clinical Practice Guidelines 2023 available now

NCSP Clinical Practice Guidelines 2023 for Cervical Screening in Aotearoa New Zealand are now available for use when HPV testing becomes the primary screen for cervical cancer prevention.

Interim NCSP Policies and Standards available

HPV primary screening – Lab talks

Dr Margaret Sage, the NCSP Clinical Lead, Pathology and National Cervical Pathology Training Service (NCPTS) Cytopathologist, has provided information videos for HPV primary screening, written to train lab staff. The videos are free to access and available on the No login is required, and you can access the videos by clicking on the HPV primary screening training in the top left-hand corner of the website homepage.

A set of ten multiple choice questions are available after each talk for you to practise applying guidelines in clinical scenarios. Anyone is free to answer the questions and you'll simply need to input a name when instructed if you'd like to answer the questions.

We encourage people to work through the questions as it can help you think about the guidelines. You are welcome to use a pseudonym, or fake name, if you prefer.

Cervical screening resources now available from HealthEd

The foundation set of updated and new cervical screening Resources, in English and Te Reo Māori, is now available to order free from HealthEd. Providers who have an email address listed on HealthPoint, or who have ordered cervical screening resources through <u>HealthEd</u> in the past year are being sent an email confirming resources are available. Please <u>let us know</u> if you think we may not have your clinic's email to ensure you are included in this update.

The first set of resources are available in English and Te Reo Māori. They have been designed to support understanding, decision-making, and aid informed consent.

Further materials will be added to <u>HealthEd</u> as they become available, so check for updates – especially if you're after additional translations.




Protecting against HPV

HPV is one of the causes of head and neck cancers and around 500 people each year in Aotearoa New Zealand are diagnosed with these types of cancers. The best way to protect tamariki against HPV is to get them immunised.

HPV vaccination is free for everyone aged 9 to 26 years and can help prevent head and neck cancers later in life.

Tamariki are typically offered the HPV vaccine in Year 7 or 8 at school when a preteen's immune system is best at creating long-lasting protection — and before many young people have been exposed to HPV.



Tamariki at schools not offering the HPV vaccine may also access it through their GP.

Support to Screening Services

The web page for Support to Screening Services teams working with both the National Cervical Screening Programme (NCSP) and BreastScreen Aotearoa (BSA).

Screening support services are available for eligible wāhine/whānau who are referred to, or who independently access services from the support to screening providers. This support can assist wāhine/whānau who experience barriers to accessing breast and cervical screening, assessment, and treatment services. Some support to screening providers have mobile teams who make community visits and home visits, while others are based in clinics around the motu.
