What is Professional Mentoring?

A professional mentor is an expert 'insider' who provides formal leadership, guidance, support, clear advice and direction to a mentee. The mentee may be a colleague, a student or a beginning practitioner who is going through a transition period within their role, re-defining their professional identity and evolving their skill set. The mentee may have formerly been an expert in their previous field and may now have some qualities of a novice within their current role.

Providing professional mentoring is a time-bounded relational practice that offers practitioners a safe space for development and reflection and may include harnessing what goes well; unpacking challenges; developing professional goals and recognising self-strengths, connections and strategies to resource and sustain self-care and care ethics.

Fundamental to mentorship is the recognition that practice begins with self-awareness. Culturally safe mentorship in Aotearoa includes the capacity to work in partnership with Māori, with awareness of Te Tiriti o Waitangi, Māori health, inequities, and social justice. The practice of providing professional mentorship to mentees is enriched through drawing on the Māori concept of the tuakana-teina relationship, where there is mutual respect and appreciation of the wealth of knowledge and experience each brings to the process, and where both are engaged in the creativity of being life-long learners, with all the uncertainty and curiosity that are part of this positioning.

Limited spaces available

What is this course about?

This two-day highly interactive short course provides a community of supportive practice to explore a toolkit that equips health professionals with frameworks and key communication skills to facilitate professional mentorship.

The confidential small group context provides an excellent opportunity to experiment with all of the components of mentorships and will equip you with the skills to develop your own mentorship practice.

This course does not include role-plays (acting out imagined scenarios) but rather focuses on participants sharing anonymised real-life situations in pairs.

Participants are provided with a soft-copy manual and are emailed a range of resources and pre-course readings.

This two-day short course with the additional readings amounts to 22 hours of professional development. A Certificate of Completion will be issued.

Who is this course for?

The course is designed to upskill Nurse Practitioners, Doctors and other Senior Practitioners involved in the mentorship of Nurse Practitioners who are working in a mentor-mentee relationship. It is also for those who would like to develop skills in professional mentor practice and support mentees in the clinical setting. The course is most suited to those who value empathic and courageous conversations and who want to support others along their learning journey and their career development.

Course Learning Outcomes:

- Cultivate an optimal relational climate for mentorship.
- Facilitate critical reflection in mentorship practice.
- Draw on strengths-based approaches and appreciative inquiry.
- Integrate activities that explore all dimensions of mentorship practice.
- Identify the scope and boundaries of the mentor-mentee role
- Critically reflect on te Tiriti o Waitangi, Māori health, diversity, and social justice within mentorship practice.
- Identify the importance of Kaupapa Māori mentorship and cultural mentorship.
- Identify the significance of professional regulation with relation to mentorship.
